Review of Modern Languages in Higher Education - Invitation to Heads of HE Modern Languages departments

A review has been commissioned by HEFCE to investigate the health of modern foreign languages provision in English higher education. The review, led by Professor Michael Worton, Vice-Provost, UCL, will make recommendations to HEFCE, Government and other partners aimed at the long-term sustainability and vitality of modern foreign languages. It will look at recent languages policy and the impact of investment in this area. An interim report is expected by 31 July 2009, followed by a final report to HEFCE's Strategically Important and Vulnerable Subjects advisory group, Government and other relevant stakeholders in September 2009. As part of the review process, a consultation event will be held at Birkbeck College in London on Wednesday 1 July. The day will be divided into two distinct sections, with the morning session for representatives from modern foreign languages in English universities; and the afternoon for representatives from the subject associations and learned societies. This is to ensure that we have as much time as possible to focus on the needs and interests of these different constituencies within the sector.

Invitations will be circulated by email in the next week; places are limited and early booking is advisable. The consultation event will be supplemented by an online survey, which will allow for the collection of responses from individuals who are unable to attend the event itself. Towards a 21st century curriculum: curriculum reform: your chance to influence education

The Qualifications & Curriculum Authority (QCA) is urging all those with an interest in

education, from teachers and parents to employers, to participate in the curriculum public consultation. This is an opportunity to influence the future of children's education in England. The Government is proposing important changes to four key areas: a new primary curriculum; the teaching of personal, social, health and economic education; level descriptions for subjects; and the non-statutory guidance for religious education. In QCA's opinion, teachers and parents are both well placed to contribute and their perspectives on the proposals are important to the consultation process. The Government will then consider its response to the consultation, which is expected to be published this autumn.

Arabic immersion course - Alexandria, Egypt, October 2009

The Department for Children, Schools and Families is committed to encouraging the diversification of the study of modern foreign languages in this country. The delivery of certain aspects of the National Curriculum can be enriched through links with schools in the Arabic speaking world and students and their teachers in these countries will also benefit from such ties. DCSF has therefore agreed with the British Council a strategy for the support of the study of Arabic through direct access to native speakers and joint collaborative activities with peers.

2009-10 Immersion Course

An Arabic immersion course will take place in Alexandria, Egypt from Saturday 24 October-Saturday 7 November 2009. The two-week course will involve Arabic tuition in the mornings and cultural activities, including lots of contact with young native speakers in the afternoons. All course activities, accommodation, transport and meals will be organised by British Council. Schools and colleges in England are eligible to apply. Student participants must be between years 8-12 and must have received at least 10 contact hours of Arabic language tuition prior to the course. However, in case of competition for places, priority may be given for years 8-10. Please note that this course is aimed at non-native speakers therefore pupils who are native speakers or speak Arabic at home are not eligible.
